

# Mysic

March was "Music in our Schools Month". We read Giraffes Can't Dance and explored different types of dances. Grades K-2 worked on reading and writing rhythms and singing on pitch. Grade 2 worked on singing and playing music using a pentatonic scale. Grade 3 worked on the instruments of the orchestra and will be creating their own instrument. Grade 4 is finishing recorder karate and playing various songs on the recorder using ECABC'D. Grade 5 worked on playing simple melodies on the piano and learned about the white and black notes on the piano. Band students should be working on practicing their first 6 notes on their instrument and practicing at least an hour each week. In music, all students learned "The Lent Song" and are learning to sing in a round. The melody is familiar but the words teach us about Lent. Ask them to sing it for you!

Happy Spring! We are paddling our way through April. We are using equipment as an extension of our body such as racket and paddle activities. We are learning the basic fundamental rules of pickleball and badminton. These are life-long activities that students can do beyond their school years. One of my focuses in physical education is staying active and healthy. # Spanish



#### March/Marzo

I hope you have all been staying warm. February was a good month with the continued return of our grade level number timings. As we

have gotten into March some grade levels are becoming quite competitive. In March we will continue to review family vocabulary, calendar vocabulary and enjoy our calendar songs. Grades 4-5 will be introduced to some subject pronouns. The Spanish alphabet will be

learned in Grade 2 and reviewed in the higher grades. Rainbow behavior rewards continue to be educational games for K-1. In Grades 2-5 it will be watching an animated, Spanish country related, movie. The movies rotate each year for all grades 2-5. This year's movie is "The Emperor's New Groove" which is a silly movie about an Incan monarch who is changed into a llama. It is set in Peru and the Andes Mountains. Each time a reward is earned the class watches 20-25 minutes of the movie, listening in Spanish with subtitles in English.

(Or listening in English with subtitles in Spanish for the younger grades.) Each time they earn a reward they watch an additional 20-25 minutes. Our goal is to complete it by the end of the school year. We enjoyed "Jesus Loves Me" in Spanish in February with sign language.

"Baby Shark", Spanish valentine edition, was also enjoyed in the younger grades. Dr. Jean songs with months and days of the week will continue to be learned or reviewed. Another by Jack Hartman will be enjoyed. Señor Hodge has a fun month version he video tapes with his students. Gr. 2–5 will enjoy a couple alphabet songs by other artists. 



# Why Do Catholics Do That

### Why do Catholics commemorate Palm Sunday?

Catholics observe Palm
Sunday, the beginning of
Holy Week, recalling
Jesus' triumphant entry
into Jerusalem. Crowds
honored Him with palm
branches, shouting
"Hosanna!" During Mass,
we receive blessed palms,
symbolizing victory and the

fleeting nature of human praise.

The liturgy includes the reading of Christ's Passion, shifting from joy to solemnity, preparing us for His suffering and sacrifice.

This day calls for solemn and thoughtful preparation for the most solemn week of the year and the joy of Easter.

### Make Easter joy last all year

Easter joy isn't meant for just one morning-it's meant to be lived every Sunday. As Pope John Paul II reminded us, "Sunday recalls the day of Christ's Resurrection. It is Easter which returns week by week, celebrating Christ's victory over sin and death" (Dies Domini). Keep that joy alive by making every Sunday a "little Easter."

Joy follows sacrifice. Just as darkness precedes the dawn, atonement for sin prepares us to fully experience Easter's triumph. Make Fridays penitential in your home-share meatless meals, fast from entertainment, go to Confession, serve others through acts of charity.

Rejoice in second chances. Jesus knows our good intentions don't always hold, so He gave us

the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Go as a family at least once a month. When children see you seeking God's mercy, they'll know it's there for them too.

Immerse yourself in the Mass. It's not meant to be observed but lived. Read the Scriptures beforehand, sing wholeheartedly, and pray with

intention. Celebrate the Resurrection with true joy.

#### Scripture John 20:19-31, Mercy triumphs over doubt


Poor Thomas! Despite his years of faithful discipleship, he will forever be known as "the Doubter." Even after witnessing Jesus' miracles firsthand for several years, he struggled to believe in the Resurrection. Not even the testimony of multiple eyewitnesses could convince him that

his Lord had returned. Yet Jesus, in His mercy, met Thomas in his doubt. A week later, Jesus appeared to him, offering the proof Thomas needed-even inviting him to touch His wounds. Thomas hesitated, but when confronted with the Truth, he embraced it.

children that God is not troubled by our questions or doubts, especially when we say, "I'm

> struggling-please help me." As we grow in faith, we will encounter ideas that challenge or confuse us. In those moments, we can turn to God in prayer and seek wisdom in the teachings of the

Church, guided by the Holy Spirit. St. Thomas' journey of doubt ultimately led him into deeper intimacy with Christ. The same can be true for usif we are willing to seek and trust.



April 7 - St. Jean Baptiste de la Salle (1719). St. John was born at Rheims, France, to a noble family, and was ordained a priest in 1678. He taught groups of poor and rich children together - which was unusual for that time. He formed the Brothers of the Christian School, a successful community of educators.

April 13 - Palm Sunday, This Sunday recalls Jesus' entry into Jerusalem when He was greeted by crowds waving palms. It marks the beginning of Holy Week. April 23 - St. Adalbert of Prague

(997). St. Adalbert was bishop of Prague, but his evangelizing activities earned him enemies and he was forced to leave. He was later invited by the Duke of Poland to evangelize Pomerania and Hungary and was martyred.

April 28 - St. Peter Chanel (1841). St. Peter Chanel entered the Society of Mary and was sent to evangelize the Marshall Islands. He baptized a few natives, including the chieftain's son. The entire island converted two years after his

martyrdom.



For more than a week, Tessa came home upset about the environment in her classroom. The way Tessa told it,
